TV Ambisonics

BREMERTON, WA—Ambisonic Surround Sound has come to network television. "Dreams," a CBS series produced by Bruce Botnick, is using Ambisonic Surround Sound in its stereo format because of its better focused and wider stereo image.

"Of all the various systems that I've tried," Botnick said, "Ambisonics is the best one. It's the only way to go in

stereo broadcasting."

Nigel Branwell, president of Audio + Design Calrec, Inc., here, explained that Ambisonics is a "surround sound" recording and broadcast system that engulfs the listener in 360 degrees of sound by the use of sophisticated circuitry in the form of Audio + Design's Ambisonic mastering package and the Soundfield microphone by Calrec Audio.

Program material Ambisonically encoded can be played back with the use of two additional speakers, a second stereo amplifier, and an Ambisonic decoder to hear the full "surround sound." Listeners without the decoder will still hear conventional mono or stereo—depending on the listening systems.

"Because of the requirements of television at this time," said Branwell, "it is vitally important that any program material must be both mono and stereo compatible. Ambisonics allows a program to sound good now, and it allows a program to sound even better—in stereo and in Ambisonic Surround Sound—when we have more consumers with stereo televisions."

In related news, Steve Hackett's newest album, "Till We have Faces," is the first rock album to be recorded Ambisonically. The first two Ambisonic discs to appear were library albums from KPM, and classical albums on Nimbus Records (available from German News Co., Inc., 218 86th St., New York, NY 10028; 212/288-6550) soon followed in general release.

The Hackett album, mixed at Marcus Music in London, will be followed by three multitrack mastered Ambisonic singles, to be released by Phonogram in Europe, by Daimyo, Tea Set, and Scotty Harrod.
